### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The J.H. Moores Memorial Natatorium (commonly known as the Moores Park Pool) is located at the eastern edge of Moores Park in Lansing near the south bank of the Grand River. The pool is an ellipsoidal-plan, above-ground structure with pumphouse, showers, lockerrooms, etc., located along the periphery of the pool wall. The pool is constructed of reinforced concrete and has a rubble-stone facade.

The pool is built into a hillside which slopes down toward the west. The axis of the pool runs east and west. The entrance facade--at the narrow end of the structure--faces west. The structure contains two levels: an upper level formed by the deck which surrounds the pool itself and a lower level comprising the interior space beneath the pool deck. The outer wall of the structure is faced with unsplit stone. The entrances to the structure's interior are on the west and consist of two pairs of blue-painted metal doors.

A plaque to the left of the doors lists the Lansing Public Park Commissioners and reads "DESIGN SUPERVISED BY W. BINTZ, CITY ENGINEER, SWIMMING POOL DESIGNS, 1922." A plaque to the right of the doors reads "J.H. MOORES MEMORIAL NATATORIUM. A.D. 1922."

The original windows on the exterior walls were long ago filled with concrete blocks and then were faced with stucco in 1980 when the entire structure was renovated. Projecting from the walls of the structure on each side of the entranceway is a large concrete decorative console parapet. Lamp standards on square pedestals form the entrances.

A balustrade of reinforced concrete construction surrounds the upper deck. Fourteen concrete lamp standards with frosted glass globes (plexiglass is now used) rise above the balustrade at regular intervals. The deck, which is approximately fifteen feet wide, runs around the periphery of the pool and is constructed of reinforced concrete. Two stairways leading from the pool deck to the interior are located at the east end. The pool's greatest depth is twelve feet at the west end; its shallowest depth, at the east end, is thirty-two inches.

The pool is built on sloping ground. Bleachers were built on the hillside above the pool's east end, and a stone walkway/staircase runs from the pool entrance around the pool structure's north side, through the center of the bleachers, and up to the street at the top of the bank. The ground at the west end of the pool is terraced and has a stone retaining wall. A modern handicapped access ramp was installed on the southwest side of the structure in 1980.

The interior of the pool structure is symmetrical, with men's facilities on the south and women's on the north. On each side of a central office, located at the west entrance, are a storage room, staff room, locker room, dry toilet, showers, wet toilet, and a stairway leading to the deck. The pumping and filtering mechanisms occupy the east end of the interior. Interior surfaces are of concrete block and cement.

The structure was sensitively upgraded in 1980 by the City of Lansing and continues to serve in its original capacity. The work done at that time included replacement of the plumbing and mechanical systems and fixtures, repair of the concrete work, including repair of sections of the concrete railings, construction of a barrier-free accessway to the pool deck, fabrication of a new iron railing (to duplicate a battered old one) which separates the deck from the bleacher area, and covering of the cement-block window infill with a thin stucco veneer.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The J.H. Moores Memorial Natatorium is significant as the prototype of the "Bintz Pool" designed and patented by Wesley Bintz. The pool is also significant for its association with J. Henry Moores, a wealthy Michigan lumberman and philanthropist who played a vital role in the development of Lansing's public park system.

J. Henry Moores came to Lansing in 1865 as a young man. Through real estate, lumbering activities in the northern part of Michigan's lower peninsula, and his interests in the Lansing Wheelbarrow Company, which became one of the city's largest firms in the late nineteenth century, Moores became one of Lansing's wealthiest businessmen.

Moores donated a great deal of his personal resources to the creation of a public park system in Lansing. He conveyed the land which became Moores Park to the city of Lansing in 1908. Moores specified in the deed that the property be used solely for park purposes, that it always be named "Moores Park," and that no intoxicating beverages be used or sold on the property. He personally supervised the park's development and in 1911 conveyed more land to the city of Lansing, increasing the size of Moores Park to twenty-two acres. It is the second oldest public park in Lansing.

The J.H. Moores Memorial Natatorium was constructed at the east end of the park with funds provided for that purpose by Moores' estate. The pool was built by the City of Lansing Engineering Department when Wesley Bintz was City Engineer. After receiving degrees in engineering from the University of Michigan in 1916 and 1918, Bintz worked for the city engineer's office in Flint, where he designed and built two public swimming pools. One, the Kearsley Park Pool, survives, but was long ago closed and filled in. Shortly thereafter he came to Lansing to work for the city engineer's office and after about eighteen months he became the city engineer. Bintz served for one year in that capacity; during that time he designed the J.H. Moores Natatorium (Moores Park Pool). He resigned from his position as city engineer in 1923 in order to devote his career exclusively to swimming pool designs.

The Moores Park Pool is the prototype of what became known as the "Bintz Pool," an ovoid, entirely above ground structure containing locker and shower rooms and pumping and filtering equipment below the deck which surrounds the pool itself. The Bintz pool was especially suited to the needs of urbanized areas and could be designed to accomodate large numbers of users. Thus the type found wide acceptance across the United States and hundreds were built in the 1920's, 1930's, and 1940's in places as far distant as Rutland, Vermont, Johnson City, New York, Rockford, Illinois, and Montevideo, Minnesota.

The Moores Park Pool has been used each season, with the exception of 1980 when the structure was renovated, since 1923. On the twenty-fifth anniversary of its dedication (September 1, 1948), the Parks and Recreation Department estimated that the pool had an average of 21,000 users each year.

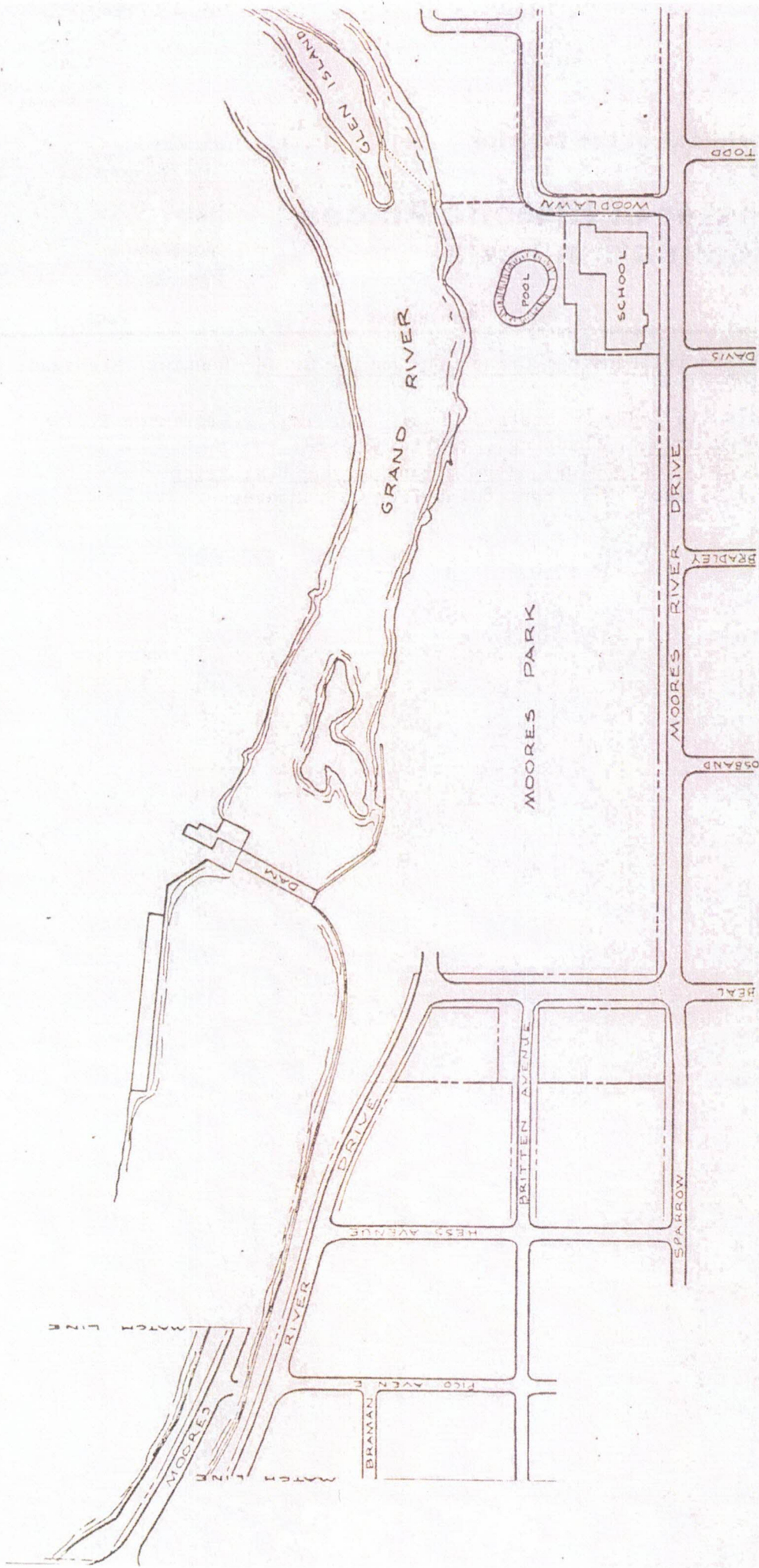

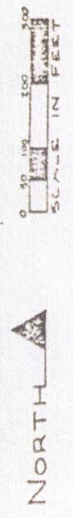

The Moores Park Pool is the prototype of what became known as the "Bintz Pool," an ovoid, entirely above ground structure containing locker and shower rooms and pumping and filtering equipment below the deck which surrounds the pool itself. The Bintz pool was especially suited to the needs of urbanized areas and could be designed to accomodate large numbers of users. Thus the type found wide acceptance across the United States and hundreds were built in the 1920's, 1930's, and 1940's in places as far distant as Rutland, Vermont, Johnson City, New York, Rockford, Illinois, and Montevideo, Minnesota.

The Moores Park Pool has been used each season, with the exception of 1980 when the structure was renovated, since 1923. On the twenty-fifth anniversary of its dedication (September 1, 1948), the Parks and Recreation Department estimated that the pool had an average of 21,000 users each year.

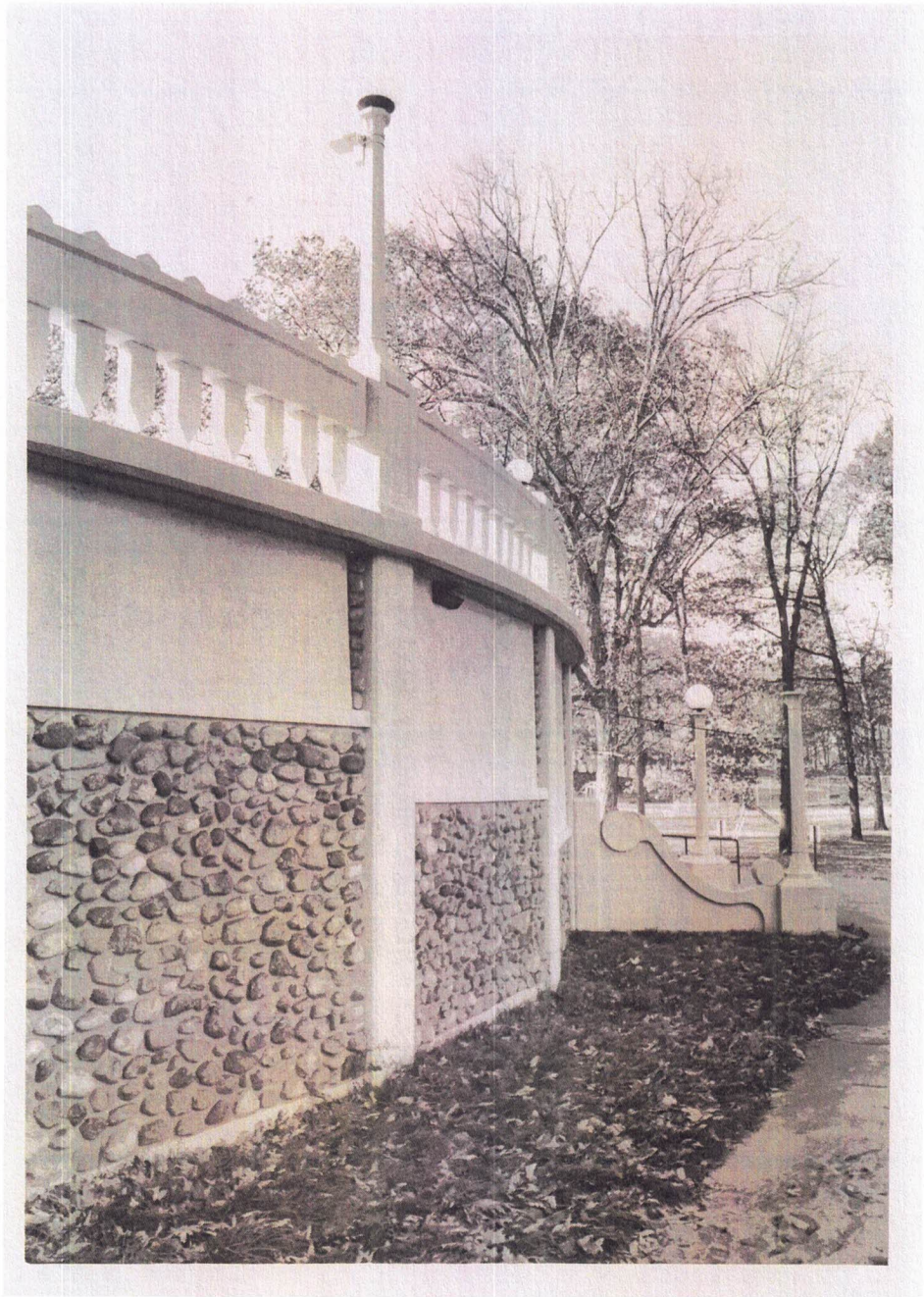

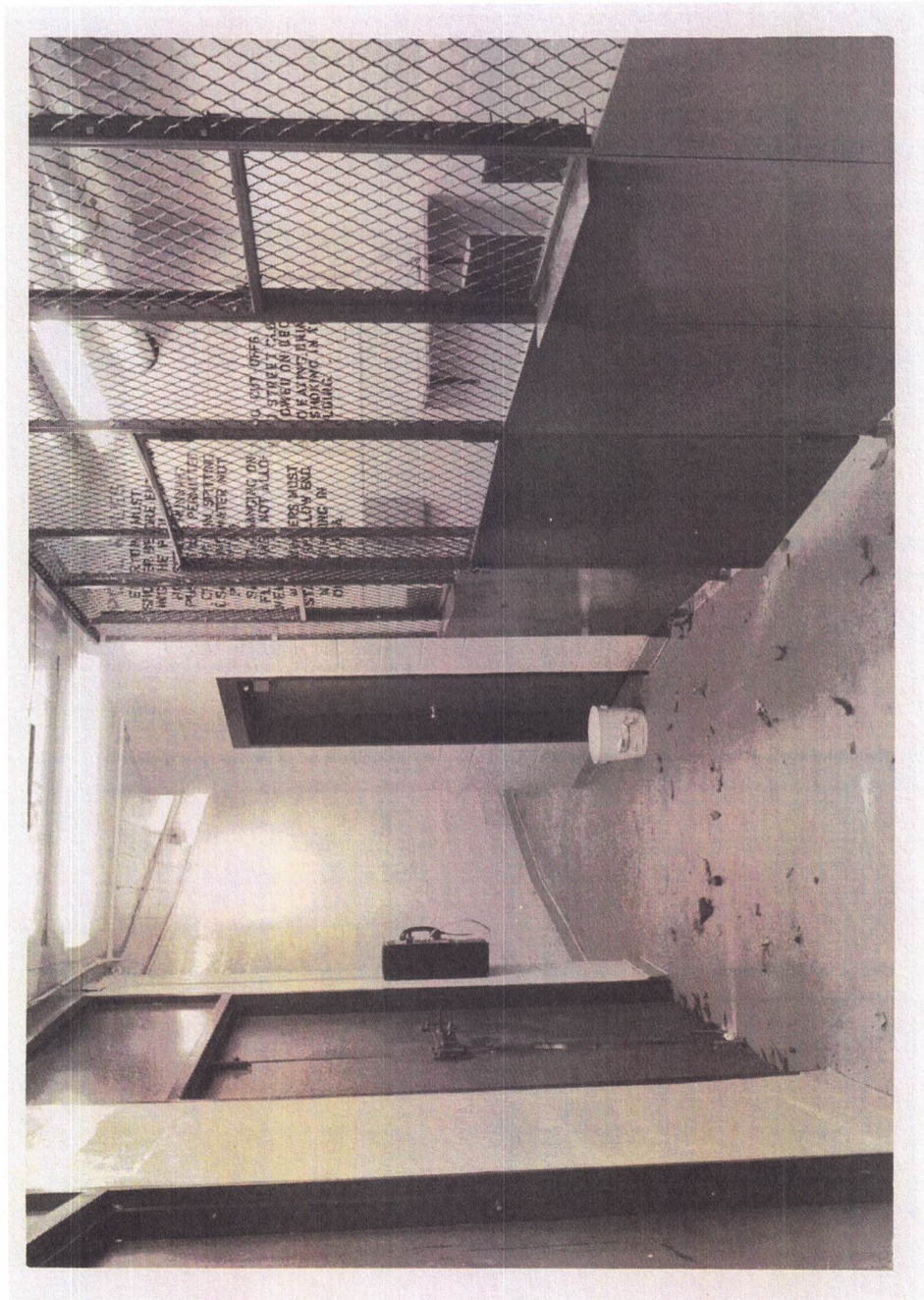

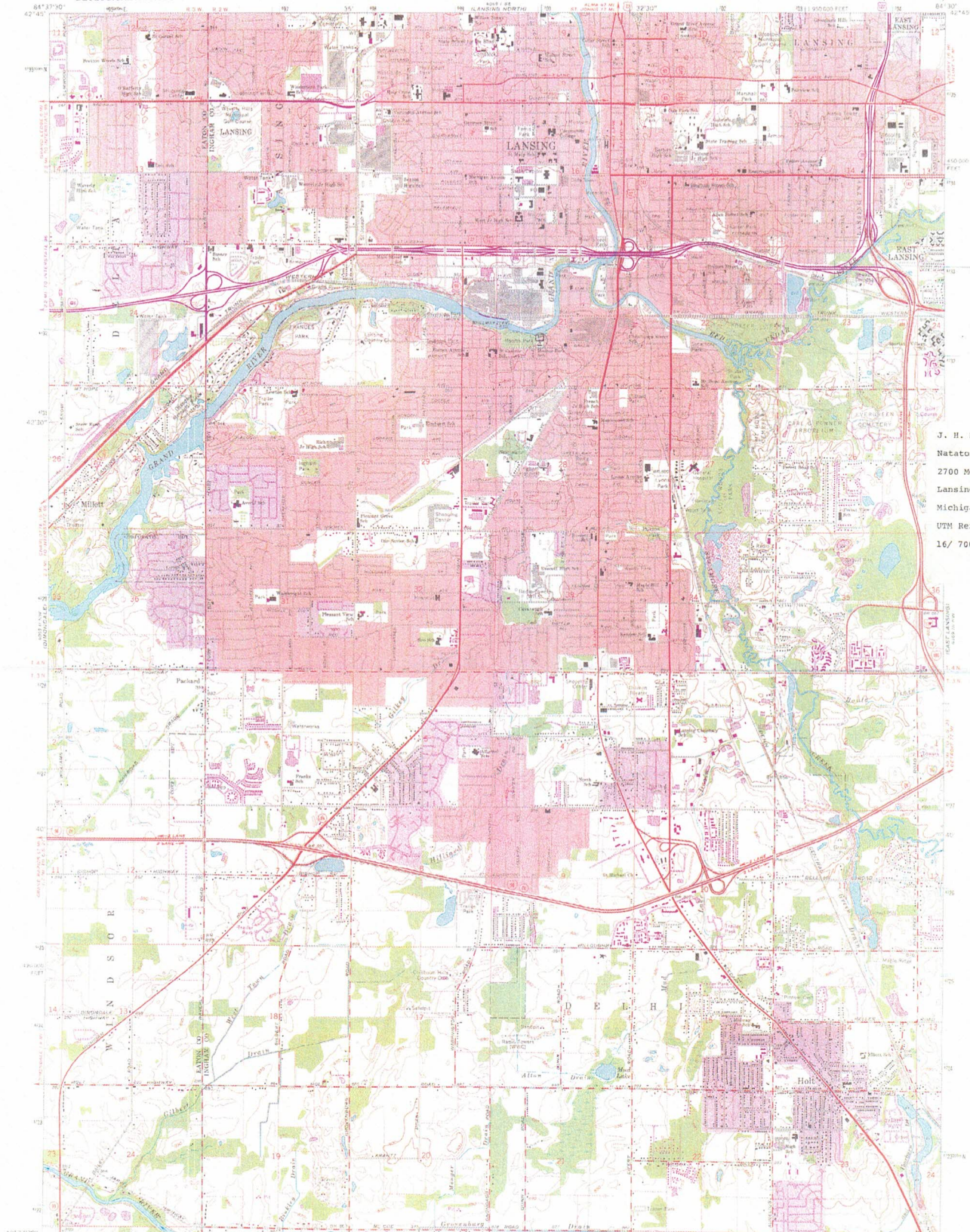
