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rom the start, Michigan citizens have spoken up when important historic properties faced threats. Homeowners organized to protect a neighborhood. Others raised their voices to save an iconic theater. Business owners fought to keep downtown from being emptied by urban sprawl.

Legitimacy was given these citizen voices with the 1966 passage of the National Historic Preservation Act. In Michigan, the country's Bicentennial in 1976 brought forth a decade's-long outpouring of local histories, historic building inventories, and designations around the state. Celebrating Michigan's cultural distinction came to a crescendo with its Sesquicentennial in 1987.

Michiganders involved in preservation could now see there were others ready to collaborate. Fast forward half-a-century! Interested individuals are now joined by trained practitioners — historians and preservationists, architects and engineers, historic and pre-historic archaeologists. Craftspeople, tradespeople, and artisans make the work possible. Adjacent expertise has grown among attorneys, bankers, developers, and others.

What this year's conference celebrates is the "collaborative spirit" that distinguishes the field. Some may earn their livings in the preservation trades or professions, but they work side-by-side with those who have purchased their first historic buildings, with newly appointed historic district commissioners, and with community leaders tapping preservation as an economic stimulus. Few other fields accommodate this constant mix of talents and commitment.

The MHPN conference supports such mutual enrichment, each participant returning to their community with fresh inspiration. How fitting we're in Kalamazoo! Through the collaboration of many, the City has raised preservation from an interesting possibility to a required consideration.

ABOUT OUR HOST COMMUNITY



Welcome to the City of Kalamazoo!

he location of modern-day Kalamazoo was home to the Pottawatomi long before the first European-Americans arrived. After they were displaced, the valley quickly filled with industries based on natural resources like bog iron and lime, and then evolving to process wood pulp into paper and to manufacture pharmaceuticals. Being at the intersection of major rail lines, the City of Kalamazoo, founded in 1829, became a hub of economic activity with diversified production including carriages, wagons, and then automobiles, as well as corsets, sleds, mandolins, and guitars. Education also played a major role in growth with the Kalamazoo Public Schools and Kalamazoo College being founded in 1833, and Western Michigan University opening in 1903.

After World War One, the population exploded, attracting African-Americans from the south and rural folks to the city's factories. The 1920s set the city's direction with the first master plan in 1929 and the debt free city in 1939. After the Second World War, the city began bumping against its boundaries with neighboring communities, swelling with new suburban homes and resulting in a series of annexations.

In an attempt to revitalize a stagnating downtown, the nation's first pedestrian mall was installed in 1959, one of the first in a series of innovative strategies to address national social and economic changes. By 1965, the Commission for Historical Preservation was formed and the first survey led to the first local historic district in 1973, established just three years after passage of Michigan's Local Historic Districts Act. In 1990, as part of a Memorandum of Agreement from a Section 106 process for a federal flood mitigation grant, the city created a permanent historic preservation coordinator position.

The City's 5 locally-designated historic districts include the Haymarket district downtown, and the Rose Place, South Street-Vine, Stuart, and West Main Hill residential districts; they are joined by 10 individual properties. With 2,060 properties locally-designated, that means 8.6% of the city's 24,000 buildings are protected. All the local districts and most of the individual properties are listed on the National Register of Historic Places as well. When Parkwyn Village was added in 2022, that brought the number of National Register-listed resources to 8 districts and 29 individual properties. Kalamazoo's local districts meet the same standards for significance and physical integrity as National Register districts, but with the protection of locally-enforced design review.

Aided by two historic commissions, for design review and for education, Kalamazoo's cityappointed bodies have designated, monitored, and regulated the historic districts, performed twelve historic resource surveys, and, working with the community and city staff, integrated preservation as a vital part of the last three city master plans. Over the decades, there have been tragic losses but they have been outweighed by spectacular saves. Join us in May. We've got a lot to talk about!

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OUR VENUE

Our Conference Headquarters The John E. Fetzer Center Western Michigan University

Born in 1901 in Decatur, Indiana, John E. Fetzer moved with his mother to Lafayette after his father died. There he developed his passion for wireless communication and baseball. Fetzer came to Michigan in 1923 to build a radio station for Emmanuel Missionary College in Berrien Springs. He bought Emmanuel's installation when the opportunity arose and moved it in 1930 to Kalamazoo, the last major Michigan city without a station. From there he grew a multistate broadcasting empire that included radio, television, and cable. Turning to his other love, Fetzer bought part of the Detroit Tigers in 1956 and became full owner in 1961. In the early 1980s, he sold his businesses and endowed the Fetzer Institute that, since 1962, had been sponsoring research into body-mind-spirit connections - an interest he pursued until his death in 1991. Fetzer's donations to WMU funded the 1983 construction of the Fetzer Center, a popular venue for educational and social events.







The Kalamazoo Ladies' Library Association is the first women's club in Michigan and the second oldest in the nation. The Association influenced development of women's organizations throughout the upper Midwest and promoted equal education. The all-female membership raised the funds to build a landmark, a Venetian Gothic gem completed in 1879. From its brick, stone, and tiled exterior, to its stained glass windows, to its lovely auditorium, the State and National Register-listed building remains a center for community activities. The 21st Century Capital Campaign in 2013 brought the building up to current standards while adhering to the Secretary's *Standards*.

All brought their own complex design requirements. Fulton Manor also required a uniquely creative vision to use the building to its fullest potential without destroying mid-century Modern details.

Houses of worship provide a unique community experience. St. Luke's Episcopal Church was designed by Gordon W. Lloyd and constructed in rock-faced stone between 1884 and1885 to look like an English parish church. Almost 30 stained glass windows are featured. The brick-and-limestone First Congregational Church was built in 1928 from a Collegiate Gothic design by Aymar Embury II. Notable studios designed its stained glass windows between 1920 and 1970. Charles Z. Klauder designed the Kalamazoo First Presbyterian Church, a Late Gothic Revival design constructed 1928-1930. Its stained glass rose window is French flamboyant Gothic. The Gothic-inspired1929 First United Methodist Church of Kalamazoo was designed by Ernest Batterson. Noteworthy stained glass windows were created by the Von Gerichten Studios in 1931.






