Call for Abstracts

The Michigan Historic Preservation Network invites you to submit a session abstract to be considered for the 46th Annual Statewide Preservation Conference. With a working title of "Enduring Distinction," the conference will take place on Thursday, May 7 through Saturday, May 9, 2026, at the Visitor

approximately 24 in-seat sessions needed for three program tracks. We are seeking sessions related to the theme, information, as well as applied skills and case studies.

New this year is the Abstract Submission Portal, an online submission system through the Whova mobile app and website we used for the 2025 annual conference registrations. If you are already using Whova, your current login and account information is all that is needed to upload your abstract submission. New users will be required to create an account. The Abstract Submission Portal is open. <u>Visit MHPN's website to learn more about the portal, conference theme, and speaker information</u>. The submission deadline is Sunday, September 21, 2025, at 11:59 p.m.

Abstracts are welcomed from Michigan's Upper and Lower Peninsulas as well as from neighboring states and Canada and may come from individuals and panels.

A note of thanks from conference scholarship recipient Candace Calloway



Webinar - Dreamtroit: A Model for the Creative Reuse of Aging Facilities

Where: Online using your phone or computer

When: July 17, 1 p.m.

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After housing varied tenants from the 1930s until 2020, the former Warren Motor Car Company factory complex buildings were rehabilitated into a mixed-use housing development called Dreamtroit. Using a complex financial structure that relied heavily on Historic Tax Credits (HTCs), the project repaired and restored the masonry facades, including cast stone and limestone trim; installed historically accurate windows; and restored character-defining interior materials. Dreamtroit's adaptive reuse has spurred substantial growth and diversification. By repurposing underutilized spaces, the project has introduced a diverse array of tenants, including affordable residential apartments, artist studios and commercial establishments. This mix of uses fosters a dynamic and inclusive community, contributing to the neighborhood's vibrancy and resilience. Dreamtroit was recognized by the MHPN in 2024 with its annual Tax Credit Award.

From the National Trust for Historic Preservation:

Federal Advocacy Update Webinar: The National Trust for Historic Preservation will hold a free webinar, "Federal Advocacy Update—What You Can Do Now," on July 16. The National Trust's Government Relations team will provide timely actions advocates can take to support historic preservation efforts and progress to date. Register today!

Historic Preservation Fund (HPF): Urge your federal elected officials to release 2025 HPF funding and fund the HPF in 2026. Despite being fully funded by Congress in March 2025 through a Continuing Resolution, Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 appropriated dollars for the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) still haven't been released. This delay threatens the work of State and Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, puts historic places at risk, and could halt preservation projects nationwide. Learn more.









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
