2026 annual conference registration opens in February

MHPN's next big event is the 46th annual conference titled, "Resilient by Design." The conference takes place May 7 through May 9, 2026, at the <u>Edsel & Eleanor Ford House (a National Historic Landmark) Visitor Center</u> in Grosse Pointe Shores.

Movement on our two House Bills has come to a halt while the Legislature deals with the State's budget. MHPN members, friends, and partners, however, are using the time to reach out to their elected officials in Lansing to let them know of their support for lifting the current \$5M annual credit cap on the Michigan Historic Preservation Tax Credit.

Communities are getting their Resolutions passed by their city councils and individuals are writing their constituent letters. The MHPN also has been at work, writing to every community in the state that participates in the Michigan Main Street Program, is a Certified Local Government, or has an Historic District Commission. These communities are among those that utilize the tax credits the most, and are most outspoken about the program's \$5M annual cap. The request is that all of them ask their City Councils to pass a supportive Resolution, as well as approve Resolutions from their own Boards and partners.

House Bills 4503 and 4504 were enrolled in May, co-sponsored by Rep. Joey Andrews (D - 38th House District) and Rep. Steve Frisbie (R - 44th House District). In addition to increasing the current annual cap, their bills propose other enhancements that will give more projects access to the credits. Eastern Michigan University announces new preservation class

Founded in 1979, Eastern Michigan University's Historic Preservation Program is the largest of its kind in the country and is certified by the National Council for Preservation Education. A new course titled "Building Preservation Technology" is starting this school year. Ron Staley, the instructor, is a nationally-recognized construction executive, Fellow of the Association for Preservation Technology, and Honorary Member of the American Institute of Architects-Michigan. Ron brings a wealth of expertise, having led high-profile restorations which include the Michigan State Capitol, the U.S. Capitol, and Detroit's newly-reopened Michigan Central Station.

Designed to meet industry demand, the new course continues EMU's interest in such technical training as first provided by early faculty members David Evans and Ilene Tyler, both Fellows of the American Institute of Architects and MHPN members. The course will equip students with technical skills, restoration methods, and material science to preserve structures built before 1975.

For over 30 years, Ron has also been involved with the MHPN, serving on the Board of Directors and as Treasurer, and regularly presenting at the annual conference. He established the MHPN's Construction Trades Council – now the Historic Resource Council – and compiled its first Annual Directory which continues to be the go-to resource to locate people and firms with experience in the renovation and restoration of historic buildings.


MHPN offers historic district commissioner training

MHPN offers workshop for Historic District Commissions. Whether the commission or commissioners are new or experienced, these workshops provide guidance and best practices to ensure your commission makes sound decisions with fair and thorough deliberations. Choose from the following training sessions:

- How to establish a local historic district
- Historic district commissioner training
- Historic district commissioner advanced training
- Local historic districts for property owners

Prior to the workshop, the trainer will request information specific to your community, so that your workshop will be tailored as much as possible to the special features and individual needs of your community. An experienced, professional preservationist facilitates these workshops. Historic District Commissions must be members of the MHPN (\$150), click here to become a member. In-person training, depending on the availability of a local trainer, is \$500. Zoom training is \$300. The training sessions typically run from 6 – 9 p.m. on weekdays. All training materials will be provided.

Michigan Historic Preservation Plan Stakeholder Workshop October 23, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. East Lansing Hannah Community Center, 819 Abbot Road, East Lansing, MI

The Michigan State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) is leading the effort to develop Michigan's next Statewide Historic Preservation Plan, which will span the years 2027-2034. The plan is not meant for the SHPO alone but aims to identify broad goals and opportunities for all preservation champions to focus on. Throughout the summer, SHPO collected feedback from the public at regional and virtual meetings about their preservation goals and concerns. Preservation stakeholders are invited to gather on October 23 in East Lansing for a special workshop to learn about the data collected, review the prior plan's goals and outcomes, and share their own thoughts and vision for the future of historic preservation in our state.
